MFA course structure/syllabus: broad distribution of topics

MFA in Art History shall consist of 72 credits. Of this 64 credits shall be in Art History and 8 credits shall be in studio practice.

Each student shall do 4 compulsory courses and choose 8 core and 2 Elective Courses

Each course is of 4 credits and 100 marks each

Students will also do a Dissertation Paper of 8 credits (4 credits for research and documentation + 4 credits for the analysis and writing of the text)
